

Chairpersons Report

It is my pleasure to again report on the year that has been for Hope Reins. As you will see in this report, it has been an active and busy year. Hope Reins has been running now for just on 3 years. We were incorporated as a not-for-profit organisation in January of 2010 and had our first participant started in April of that year. Some of our volunteers started at this time too and continue faithfully to this day.

We decided this year that we needed to hold an official opening for Hope Reins in September. For us, it was like drawing the line in the sand and declaring we were here. So even though we have had many participants as part of the programme since 2010, we have been developing our facilities and growing all the while.

The major change in our facilities was the building of a place to sit and chat in the visitor's area. We chose an eight-sided gazebo in a classic federation style because of its elegance and beauty. It so enhances the look of the place and makes a statement from the road. It is named after a good friend and supporter of Hope Reins, Jennifer Edwards. Jen loved to chat and build relationships with people and, as this was the purpose of the gazebo, it was named Jens Chatroom. With the sand arena, large and small round yards, hay shed and tack room and the lane way leading from the front gate to the visitor area, you really have a clear picture of how the site is developing and how it will grow. Mention should be made of the fence posts that have been cut by Ian Hughes in a long-term project for our permanent fencing. Not only has he sourced trees, cut logs, and then arranged their transportation here, he is now splitting and pointing logs for the fences.

This year we printed our brochure and business cards in time for our official opening in September. We believe the brochures look stunning. Thanks to Linda Watt for her work on this. I was able to hand some of them out and the business cards too at Equitana, so our advertising has gone beyond Gympie and is further afield. Speaking of that, we had a report on the Channel 7 news about Hope Reins just before the Official

Opening. We believe this report went across Queensland as we had feedback from people in Cairns seeing the report.

We received our first international visitors around Christmas time. They run a similar ministry in Hawaii and learned about Hope Reins from Crystal Peaks Youth Ranch in the USA (on which the Hope Reins Programme is based and where Ruth and I went in 2009 to learn how to start this ministry).



We have had a growing interest in the programme and our participants have continued to come from various sources — referrals from counsellors, schools, youth justice, and other community groups. We know that we are making a difference in the lives of these participants as we hear report after report "that it works like nothing else has". We praise God for his work through us.

Our volunteers have increased in number and we now have a vibrant volunteer session on Tuesday afternoons from 4pm until 6pm. We also have volunteers on Thursday, some who stay all day and some who come for specific sessions.

It is not unusual to have 15 volunteers here for lunch. We also have a session on Saturday morning. It is an understatement to say that this ministry would not exist without the contribution of these amazing people.

This year we had our first student placement in the shape of Emily Edwards. Emily is doing qualifications in youth work and so a placement with us helped her and helped us! She has continued on as a volunteer.

We have rescued and received a number of horses in the past year including a Cheeky — an exmustering horse from Imbil, a Cooloola Coast brumby (now named Toby), a stock horse with no sight in his right eye (named Eagle), 3 minature horses (all rehomed), Promise's mum (Beauty) who had previously been loaned to us but was then given. She will eventually be rehomed with one of our volunteers. We also received another horse named Toby who is now named Toby Too and 2 Shetlands — Emmie Lou and Shiloh.

Worthy of mention, mainly because it highlights how Ruth's and my dogs also contribute to this ministry, is our entry into the Gympie Show. Clancy our 3-legged dog took out 3rd place in the medium dog section and 3rd place for child handler (who was a participant of the programme).

Two other events within this year which will probably become yearly events were Carols at Chelem – a carols by candlelight event and an Easter Sunrise service on Easter Sunday morning. Both took amazing advantage of their location and were very special.

The weather events of drought (before Christmas) and floods in January, have brought their own challenges with providing feed to the horses, but we are managing to weather this storm as all people on the land try to do.

I know I cannot talk on too much in this report (hard for me I know), but I could do so by thanking all the wonderful people who have helped out in so many ways. People have donated money, time, energy, and talents generously to this ministry. Without all of you we would not have healing horses helping hurting humans.

The financial statement prepared by Ellingsen Partners is contained in the following pages for your perusal.

Hope Reins is in a reasonable financial position because of the generousity of many people. It has helped to have regular donations as this allows for a better budgetry anticipation. This is an area we need to develop perhaps with horse sponsorship as a means of attaining this.

I think it is good to emphasise that Hope Reins is entirely donor funded. We receive no government funding for this work.

We did receive one grant application this year. It was for equipping our volunteers and as a result some generators were purchased to assist in the work around the farm.

We have been able to sustain payment of Wayne Dobson who contracts to Hope Reins one day a week, doing general maintenance and land care duties. This has been a great help to all and enables the property to look cared for and impressive!

Highlights of the year



The major highlight for the year was the Official Opening of Hope Reins. Our guests included Gary McClintock from Gympie Ministers Network, Counsellor Mick Curran from Gympie Regional Council and David Gibson, Member of Parliament for Gympie in our State Government. It was he who cut the ribbon and declared Hope Reins open.

Trying to green up grass in the midst of drought was a hard part to the opening day. We had a barbeque with items for sale (the profits going to local chaplaincy), games including kite flying, giant parachute games, pillow fights on a slippery log, tug-o-war, and loads of other games. We had horse handling displays as well as all the horses to view. Some had words painted on them such as loved, trust etc.

The photos give a great indication of events.





Other highlights included the work with our participants. The eight week programme sees different individuals coming to the different sessions we have on offer. These include, Thursday morning, Thursday afterschool and Saturday morning.

Participants come out for two hours and work one-on-one with one of our volunteer leaders. For one hour they do a farm chore — which includes picking up horse poo, gardening and weeding in our flower gardens and vegie patch, fencing, walking the dogs, and a myriad of other tasks. The second hour they work with a horse and again one volunteer leader. So their experience is entirely unique and suited absolutely to their skills and level of ability.

Over the eight weeks the participants are introduced to the stories of the horses and usually one horse's story will resonate with their own story, or will have an impact on them. They are shown how to safely approach a horse, learn about horses as prey animals and basic information on horse communication.

We then show how to catch, halter, groom and pick up horses feet. We give them a riding experience in the saddle and bareback on the horse. The bareback experience is a trust exercise and has become a very significant part of the programme. Participants have to let go, close their eyes and stretch out their arms all while the horse is being led around. It makes you very aware of your own vulnerability and how much trust we need.

During the 8 weeks we will also get participants to paint on a horse a significant word that they have learnt about themselves or they have generally learnt through coming to Hope Reins. Some of these words, - courage, trust, faith, friendship, winner, - really highlight the impact of the programme on young lives.

After Equitana, Kylie brought back another activity for us – Friendship Lane – an exercise where participants and horses together are a team that, without lead ropes and halters, must walk together down a designated laneway.

For the first time at the end of Term 4, we gave a letter to each participant highlighting their learning and giving them a positive message that was individual to them and their potential. We also included photos of them on the letter as a lasting memory. One participant, on seeing his letter, immediately asked his mother to laminate it, such was its significance to him.






Of course, we also have lots of fun. Poo fights can occur and on hot days, water pistols

Kids Roundup



Kids Roundup occurs on
Thursdays in school holidays
from 2pm to 5pm. This year
was our first complete year of
doing this and it seems to be
working very well. We operated in partnership with the
Uniting Church in Gympie.
A lot of programmes for children run by churches occur in
school term time and there is
not a lot happening during

school holidays. So we believe there is a huge place for running a programme and reaching out to kids (both churched and unchurched) and talking about how Jesus would have us live our lives.

The programme uses the space and size of the property by having "big" games – usually more physical than can be offered in a church based programme. We have used horses on occasion, but usually the games are reliant on creativity to devise them. We use equipment borrowed from the youth and community development at Gympie Regional Council and this has greatly helped us.

Children who participate are from Prep to Year 7 in age. They pay \$2 for the afternoon (to help cover costs) and we provide them with afternoon tea. Usually there are 4 or 5 games – focussed by a theme which is then highlighted in a "God Spot" where we teach truths from the bible.

Parents are invited to stay and if they do, we usually use them or invite them to be part of the activity. Multiage activities is part of the ethos of Hope Reins.

On the second week of each holiday we have a dress up theme. Some of the themes have included – Cowboys, Promises, Wild and Wet, The Journey, and Clowning Around.

The Vacation Care of the Christian Family Church have started to come out and this increases our numbers for that day significantly. Sometimes there can be more than 20 kids in this group alone. In April 2013, a realisation of the original vision for Kids Roundup came to fruition with the arrival of a coach load of vacation care kids arrived. When we had first thought about Kids Roundup as part of the Hope Reins programme, coach loads of kids arriving was what I had talked about. It was quite extraordinary to see this in reality!

Girls Bible Study

After volunteer time on a Tuesday (and when it is not Pot Hope week) we have a bible study in the shed for girls (or females anyway). The bible study goes from 6:30 to 7:30 and along with our regular attendees we have had a number of others who have come from time to time.

It has become a very precious time of learning about God, and caring for each other.

Pot Hope Dinners

Once a month, on a Tuesday evening, we have Pot Hope Dinners. Starting at 6pm and going until 9pm or so, the dinner is provided by people bringing a pot of food and sharing it (in the style of a potluck dinner). We light a fire in the drum and people enjoy sitting around this and chatting. After grace, everyone lines up and gets a full plate of an assortment of food. We average about 30 people for each dinner. As a number of these are children or young people, we sometimes have some activities for them to play as well. However they inevitably end up playing in the dark – I guess because when you are a kid, there is a delicious-ness about doing so!!!!

After dinner, we gather everyone around the fire and have a sharing time. This has been led by different people talking about God incidences in their lives and their learning from these times. General discussion can then occur and this carries on through dessert.


We have developed a core group of people who are regularers to the dinner and who then can help ensure those who are new and particulary those who are not Christian, feel comfortable and welcomed.
